In the fourth quarter, the three swords symbolize the three dynasties of the Tuʻi Tonga, Tuʻi Haʻatakalaua and Tuʻi Kanokupolu.

The three dynasties represent a critically important component of Tonga's inheritance. This encapsulates the contents of Christian Education and permeates all its taught knowledge, skills, and values, centring on God and Tonga.

The contents of Christian Education teach students to *know God* and *be like Him* in His character and works. The theory of Christian Education is based on the recognition that God is truth and anything that conflicts with His Holy Word is not legitimate. Students must be taught His Word, and its truths determine the other subject matters and the ways in which they are taught.

But the works of God are also important in gaining a deeper understanding of Him. Man who was created in the image of God is the highest of God's work. Thus, the study of the humanities, which include man's languages, literature, art, history, mathematics, economics, and other forms of cultural expressions are proper contents for study of the works of God.

So too are the **natural sciences**, which look at the glory and wonders of God's creation and testify to his power and the beauty and order of His creation. These were created to help man, for him to enjoy, and to realise God's love for him. The Christian Education curriculum, thus, includes *astronomy*, *physics*, *chemistry*, *biology*, *mathematics*, *and related subjects*, *and other related fields* because they all demonstrate the glory and goodness of God.

Skills and the disciplining of the students in various subject areas also equip the students for service. General, technical, and vocational subjects are studied to prepare the students to serve God more perfectly and physical training and the proper care of the body that God has created to serve Him are also included. It means that all the student's abilities and talents are developed to glorify and to serve God. It includes also her/his power to create and aesthetic taste. In fact all her/his skills and abilities are fully developed to serve God.

The *methods* employed also align with the truths of the Holy Word. The *teacher* plays a key role in the whole process. He or she is the image of God that the students see and the teacher who is filled with the Holy Spirit will achieve the aims of Christian Education and therefore, her/his professional and spiritual preparation is a critical issue. He or she is required to know his or her students, master the subject matter to be taught and the most appropriate method to be used. But the *student* must also come prepared to learn, to follow, and to accept the rule of the teacher and the school. All these will be aligned to the Bible-based philosophy of Christian Education to ensure that all Tongan children understand both, where they may differ, and how to resolve any conflicts between the two.

This truth enlightens all the processes of Christian Education.	As stated already, Tongan processes will be married to Biblical processes, where they serve to support those processes and are not in conflict. But their inclusion and integration will assist the Tongan child to understand and respect his/her own culture and traditions as well as becoming a living testimony of Christ's unfailing love, mercy, and grace.

Contents The contents of Christian Education teach students to know God and be like Him in His character and works. The theory of Christian Education is based on the recognition that God is truth and anything that conflicts with His Holy Word is not legitimate. Students must be taught His Word, and its truths determine the other subject matters and the ways in which they are taught. But the works of God are also important in gaining a deeper understanding of Him. Man who was created in the image of God is the highest of God's work. Thus, the study of the humanities, which include man's languages, literature, art, history, mathematics, economics, and other forms of cultural expressions are proper contents for study of the works of God. So too are the natural sciences, which look at the glory and wonders of God's creation and testify to his power and the beauty and order of His creation. These were created to help man, for him to enjoy, and to realise God's love for him. The Christian Education curriculum, thus, includes astronomy, physics, chemistry, biology, mathematics, and related subjects, and other related fields because they all demonstrate the glory and goodness of God. Skills and the disciplining of the students in various subject areas also equip the students for service. General, technical, and vacational subjects are studied to prepare

The *methods* employed also align with the truths of the Holy Word. The *teacher* plays a key role in the whole process. He or she is the image of God that the students see and the teacher who is filled with the Holy Spirit will achieve the aims of Christian Education and therefore, her/his professional and spiritual preparation is a critical issue. He or she is required to know his or her students, master the subject matter to be taught and the most appropriate method to be used. But the *student* must also come prepared to learn, to follow, and to accept the rule of the teacher and the school. The *administrator* is also a key player by providing the environment that is most conducive for the development of the student's personal relationship with Christ. When all these elements work harmoniously together, the goal of the holiness in the student's character is eventually achieved.

But as discussed previously, the whole body of Tongan knowledge, skills, languages, history, arts, beliefs, and values, ways of knowing and thinking, artefacts, processes, pedagogy, and evaluative tools, will be integral components of Christian Education so that every Tongan child will grow up fully developed in his/her inheritance – God and Tonga - and can apply these in his/her daily life from here to eternity.

7. Outcomes

The outcome of all these efforts will be *transformed men and women of Tonga* who are fully aware of the seeking love of God as revealed in Jesus Christ and who respond in faith to His love in ways that help them grow as children of God, live in accordance with the will of God, and sustain a vital relationship with the Christian Community. Christian Education will raise men and women who are *fully reborn in Jesus Christ* and *who have all accepted Him as their personal Saviour and live lives of total commitment and service to Him.* They fully enjoy God's presence here on earth and serve Him and their fellow human beings with all their God-given power, but their *final destination is* not here and now on this Earth but *Heaven itself and eternal life*. The crown symbolises their final destination - the crown they will be wearing in Heaven.

He/she is a truly living and practising Christian, mirroring the image of Jesus Christ, his Saviour, believing and loving God with all his heart, soul, body, and mind, but, nonetheless, a Tongan Christian in a Tongan context, who is proud to be Tongan, speaks the Tongan language, knows its history, respects his culture, and the reciprocal love that transforms his community into a 'family'. He is someone who knows, lives, and practises his inheritance, "Ko e 'Otuá mo Tonga ko Hoku Tofi'á."

In the second quarter is a crown that symbolizes the monarchy.

But it also symbolizes the ultimate prize that every Tongan Christian strives for – a royal crown in Heaven, the outcome of Christian Education – that every child in Tonga will be saved into eternal life.
